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While the actual solution doesn't have to be so long, the way you write it makes it look like you don't know the language well enough to be able to write sentences that make any sense. PITTSBURGH -- As his Cincinnati Bengals prepare for their fifth straight playoff game, running back Giovanni Bernard would probably like a word with quarterback Andy Dalton. If we told Bernard he could talk to Dalton at any point during practice, he'd be all about it. "At one point or another, definitely," Bernard said. "He's a good player, we can always talk. It's the best quarterback in the NFL right now. We're good friends, and he's always asking about me. He's always talking to me. I think he's the best quarterback to ever play this game. I think he's not only the best quarterback in the NFL but he's the best ever, and he's getting better every year and getting more comfortable. It's going to be a good battle up there." It's an interesting subplot for a game the Bengals have worked on so much. Over the past five weeks, they've seen Bernard enter the field twice at the goal line, once with 48 seconds to go and a 16-13 loss to the Pittsburgh Steelers in week 17 and then with one play to go with the game tied, a touchdown pass to Giovani Bernard set up by Andy Dalton's pass to A.J. Green for a 46-yard field goal win over the Daltas Cowboys. Both times, the Bengals had to block for Bernard on an end-around run, with Cincinnati's sacking Bernard both times, pressuring him on the edge. The second time, Steelers defensive coordinator Keith Butler blocked for Bernard and lined up his teammates across the line of scrimmage to stop the play. The first time, it was a different theme. "We're making the same mistakes all over again," Bengals line when I'm five yards from the goal line. We've done that so much that it's starting to creep into our head some more. We've got to stop doing that." For Bernard's part, he's not trying to make things easier for the Bengals. "I'm
